Island records

Powerpop trio The Risk have been laying down tracks for their first album in more than 20 years. Shaun Shackleton spoke to Mark Le Gallez about how the band ended up recording on the Isle of Arran

HE Risk have been in the studio laying down tracks for their latest album, 22 years after their last – Songs From the Big Tomato. But The Risk (Mark Le Gallez

'The studio is called Isle of Arran Recording Studios at Lochranza on the Isle of Arran,' said Mark Le Gallez on the phone, before nipping out to Sainsbury's at Timperley. 'It's owned by Stan Robertson, who was in a Glasgow band in the 70s called The Sensational Jeepers Creepers, silversuited Teds who supported Showaddywaddy, but they were better musicians. He used to play in Glasgow clubs in the 60s when the razor gangs were about. He's a lovely man.' How did The Risk end up on the Isle of

'Colin [who lives on the coast of Kintyre, Argyll] was trawling around, looking for mainland and island studios,' said Mark. 'He found out about Stan's place and went to visit him. They got on like a house on fire and they arranged to bring The Risk up.

Ozzy got the plane from Guernsey to Manchester and then the train to Glasgow and Mark got the train up. The band was there for three days and three nights and laid down five tracks while they

The session saw Mark's debut in The Risk playing electric guitar.

'I couldn't do the notes on bass for one song. Col showed me how but it was a four-fingered pattern and my little hands couldn't reach, so Col played

bass and I played guitar.' There are plans to return to the studio early next year with the album's release

As there is always news when talking to Mark (the fella is always busy), he told me about a couple of

other projects that are happening.
'I've been working with a guy called Dave Barker from Preston. We've become really good mates. He's actually a fan of The Risk. He contacted me and said he had something for me to sing on. It's not something that I've really done before. It's keyboard-driven. It's described as "Acid Jazz, ska, with nods to legendary acts like XTC and The Doors". His band is called The DBC, the Dave Barker Collective. We went into the studio in Salford and the engineer there, Biff, asked Dave how many tracks had he got and Dave said "52". "Not a problem" said Biff. I sang on a track called The Good Companions." After two EPs, Mark has a full album coming out next year with The Mark Three, the combo he

formed with Paul Hooper-Keeley on guitar and keys and Emma Page on drums.

And I'm doing my spoken word stuff at the open mic night at The Kings Head in Salford next Monday,' he said. 'You've gotta keep busy, eh?'
